President's Message

The songwriter Harry Chapin may be familiar to you from his song "Taxi", or "Cat's in the Cradle", but maybe you've heard him sing "Mr. Tanner" as well. Mr. Tanner sings in the church choir, and his friends talk him into going to New York to give a concert. His performance is poorly received by the critics, and Mr. Tanner himself "did not know how well he sang; he only heard the flaws".

Most of us have experienced "hearing" only the flaws in something that we do, whether it's playing an instrument, preparing a new recipe, or making a quilt. How many times has someone shown you a quilt that they made while hastening to say "I know this color doesn't blend well", or "I wish I'd matched these points better"? Maybe they're right and the colors don't blend and the points don't match, but what about their perfect binding and the lovely quilting?

In my working days, my team always held a "post mortem" at the end of a project. The objective was to understand what went badly that we could improve next time, and what we did really well that we could add to standard practices. This approach can be applied to nearly anything we undertake, including our quilting skills. In fact, you probably do this without giving it much thought. Yes, definitely identify the flaws, and if they pertain to something you want to master, practice the technique and find someone to coach you in it. But first of all look for your successes. Maybe your color palette really pops and can be used again or modified slightly for a different look; maybe those appliqued flowers that you had so much fun doing are perfect and you could expand your use of applique in your next quilt.

Don't just focus on your flaws. You're too special for that! Look first and foremost for the beauty in everything you do. And next time you show a friend a quilt you've made, be proud of what you accomplished; and if he or she is really a friend, they'll only see the beauty, too.

We will discuss what value is and how to "see" it, along with changing the value in a color and checking the contrast of value in a quilt. There will also be some ideas on how to sort your own fabric by values.

You can participate in the program by bringing in two types of quilts – one where the values really worked well, creating a great quilt, and one where the overall quilt pattern or design just didn't show up because the values all blended together.

QU will be using the following colors for this block:

Color 1 = White fabric – solid or tone on tone

Color 2 = Mint/Light Green fabric – solid, tone on tone or print

Color 3 = Pink fabric - solid, tone on tone or print

May's Block will A Dandy. We will create a charity quilt for a veteran with these patriotic blocks.



QU will be using the following colors for this block (Americana - like represented on the Quilter's Cache pattern):

Color 1 = Dark Red fabric – solid or tone on tone

Color 2 = Dark Blue/Navy fabric – solid, tone on tone or print

Color 3 = Cream/Beige fabric - solid, tone on tone or print

"Autumn Reverie" 2019 Guild Challenge

The Challenge Quilt Rule sales are doing okay, but it would be great to sell some more at the next few meetings. It would be even greater if I heard more folks say they will be producing a challenge quilt for us to "ooh!" and "aah!" over at this year's September meeting.

Translate your daydreams of autumn into this year's challenge quilt using your favorite quilting style, or let your thoughts wander and your skills expand into new quilting techniques.

This year's rules should suit any style. We hope it gives you food for thought, sparks your imagination, and results in a quilt that is uniquely yours as you incorporate the required elements contained in the 2019 rules. As you know, I have done a few of these over the years, and in my experience, some of the rule "requirements" that I first frowned over have later become that twist that have given my finished quilt that little feature that elevated it into one of my favorite quilts.

The challenge is open to traditional quilters and art quilters—new quilters and experienced quilters. Entry must be an original design and made by a single individual. As always, keep your challenge a secret.

Happy to say that we have quite a committee of folks helping with the challenge this year. Marsha Walper will be selling the rules at the guild meetings when I am unavailable. And I want to thank Jeanne Brenner and Ruth Cuzzort for agreeing to handle the voting portion of the challenge.

At this time our challenge quilt reveal and voting is scheduled for the September 2019 guild meeting.
