President's Message

Ever wonder whether you're keeping up with modern trends in quilting? Well good news, quilters! Based on my completely unscientific survey of articles touting "Quilting Trends to Watch in 2019", if you've made anything at all with fabric, you're among the trend-setters this year!

Today I compiled trend lists from four articles where the authors presented their findings in various states of breathlessness after discovering these currents in the ocean of quilts they reviewed. Out of the 37 "trends" identified, only three made it to more than one list, so that's 34 different quilting ideas to choose among if you want to call your work "trendy".

Are you into English paper piecing or foundation paper piecing? Do you dream about triangles, stripes, curves, or hexies? Perhaps you long to fondle batiks that don't feature leaves, or yards of screen prints, or fill your basket with pre-cuts. Maybe you'll make a pillow to match a whole cloth masterpiece that's been densely quilted by a long-armer. Does a neutral palette make you drool? Do you dare to add a touch of black, or does a rainbow quilt or simply one with "lots of color" make your motor race? Personally, I'm not sure whether I'm a maximalist or a minimalist, have Bohemian tendencies, or secretly want to piece an asymmetrical quilt top in a playful fashion. I am 100% certain, though, that I will never, ever make a quilt from fabric having a science theme using a weaving technique to give it a texture boost.

I would continue, but I'm getting a little dizzy. I think I'll go meditate and visualize joining a virtual quilting bee, making an appliqued animal quilt with a center medallion that sends a message about Mother Earth, then framing it. Now where'd my husband hide the dark chocolate and red wine?

Marianne will discuss various creative aspects about how to effectively include borders in quilts. There are the decisions of whether a quilt even needs a border and when to add either another border or more blocks to make a quilt larger. She will also show how to make sure the borders are not too long or too short, which will avoid wavy borders or a wavy quilt. In addition, she will give her easy way to make mitered borders and double-mitered borders.

Bring your questions about border problems and also your quilts that may have border issues. Marianne will be glad to offer her suggestions on how to remedy our quilt problems.

October's Block is Moon Over the Mountain

Pattern is from Quilter's Cache – <u>http://www.quilterscache.com/M/MoonOvertheMountainBlock.html</u>

QU will be using the following colors for this block (think night sky): Color 1 = Dark (Blues/night sky) – solid, tone on tone or print Color 2 = White, Grey or Cream (moon color) – solid, tone on tone or print Color 3 = Dark (Brown/Black/Gray) - solid, tone on tone or print

Machine appliqué or hand appliqué is acceptable.

Please follow the directions to create your 12.5" unfinished block.



November's Block is Steps to the Altar 2

Pattern is from Quilter's Cache – <u>http://www.quilterscache.com/S/StepstotheAltar2Block.html</u>

QU will be using the following colors for this block – Think Patriotic:

Color 1 = Red fabric – solid, tone on tone or print Color 2 = Blue fabric – solid, tone on tone or print Color 3 = White fabric – solid, tone on tone or print

Please follow the directions to create your 9.5" unfinished block.

We will have printed copies of the pattern and half circle templates at the Block of the Month table.

Baby Bib Style	
Cut neck opening in one short side of towel.	
Cut approximately 36" of double-fold bias tape.	
Iron some curve into the center 12" of the tape.	26
Attach tape to neck opening sewing tape closed	
along length to create ties for bib.	15

Quilts Looking for a New Home

We have received a letter from a gentleman in Tallahassee who is downsizing, asking whether someone might be interested in providing a home for some items he has found during this process. He is not looking for remuneration; these are free for the taking.

The first is a 36" x 56" crib quilt made for him by an aunt shortly after WWII. It features an old-fashioned applique scene and is hand quilted. He once used it as a tent, placing it over a lamp that had no shade, which resulted in a burn mark which has not been repaired. You might want to try your hand at repairing it or leaving it 'as is'.

The second of his finds is a pair of framed pieces from a crazy quilt. The frames measure 12" x $26\frac{1}{4}$ "; the quilt pieces are $6\frac{1}{2}$ " x $20\frac{1}{2}$ ". He found these in his father's farmhouse and guesses they may have been made by either his grandmother or perhaps his great-grandmother.

There is no long-term commitment! Come and help out at any meeting! We follow the LCSD calendar and meet on the 1st and 3rd Thursdays at the Leon County Extension Office, 6-8 pm (and also at 3:45-5:45 pm during Oct & Nov) located at 615 Paul Russell Rd. (behind the fairgrounds).
