The "Year of Scrappy Triangles" patterns for paper piecing all 53 of the designs (with #53 being a "bonus week") were created by Leila Gardunia and are available for free from her website. So how many of these six-inch squares have you completed so far? Once I quilt and finish this, it will find a home with someone in the Sleep in Heavenly Peace project.

Special Report: Intrepid Quilters Take Iowa by Storm

Exclusive report from Linda Stright, who says "It was a blast!"

All Iowa Shop Hop June 2021

The adventure starts with our friend, Barb, who was a former quilt shop owner in Tampa. She heard about AISH and watched it grow over the years. It has been on her bucket list for a long time. She divorced last year and decided this was the year to do AISH. She invited some friends to join her and 3 of us signed on. The All-Iowa Shop Hop happens from June 1 to July 31 and this was their ninth year.



We decided 2 weeks would give us time to do all 86 shops. In our favor, the number of shops participating this year had dropped from 93 in previous year. Many, many hours went into planning and our travel route. It all had to work with shop hours. Not all shops had special hop hours or were not open on weekends, or Monday or Tuesday. All that was taken into account in the planning. We flew into

Des Moines on Sunday June 6; after settling into our big honking rental SUV we visited 4 quilts shops before calling it a day. We set a time limit in each store, Barb would blow her train whistle when time was up. Most of the time it was ignored! Our first full day we visited 11 shops. Most shops were fairly close together. We set a lofty pace the first few days to see how it would go. And could we do it? By day 5 we had visited 40 shops and were one day ahead of our schedule!



We called ourselves the Tallahassee Lassies, had Florida like headbands and developed a following along the way from our posts on the AISH Facebook page. People wanted to know where we were from and why would we come to Iowa! We got that reaction many times. We started hearing about another IA group of hoppers called the Shop Hop Sisters, aka the Orange Ladies. We finally were able to meet



them. They have projects they challenge themselves to and play games, like bingo and dice rolling that also involves the shop owners. They are buying specific for a project, unlike random like us. We had fun talking to them in several shops before parting ways. We had several husbands hopping with their wives and when we would announce our presence in a shop and if the wife was there, she'd say "oh, my husband is following you on FB. Let me go get him so he can meet you." Pictures would be taken and telling of our story would happen. What a hoot!

As we continued our adventure, we were able to relax and enjoy lunches at several recommended



restaurants instead of snacks in the car. Driving distances between shops got longer. We only had several 50-to-90-minute drives between shops. We saw much of what Iowa has to offer. Lots of corn fields, soy bean fields, pig barns, wind turbine fields. Iowa is not flat, there were many rolling hills and beautiful vistas. We took many scenic highways, some dirt roads included, but



we never got lost! Thanks to our excellent navigator, Debbie and driver Barb, oh, and GPS! And Karen was the best hotel reservationist!



The AISH is divided into six regions and we were making a counter clockwise route with zigs and zags from Des Moines. By day nine we were finishing the North Central region with one region to go and a few in the Des Moines area and two days ahead of schedule! We enjoyed

many Iowan fares, to name a few, Dutch Letters, a flaky pastry with an almond filling (yum!), tenderloin sandwiches, homemade pie at several restaurants, ribeye and other steaks and loose meat sandwiches by MadeRite, we didn't care for those. We enjoyed the friendly Iowan hospitality wherever we were and the shop owners and staff were welcoming, friendly and very helpful. We collected a free 4 1/2" square from each shop, signed up for in-store drawings and got our passports stamped. The passports are turned in and all kinds of many wonderful prizes will be drawn in August. It was an incredible adventure!



We finished on our second Thursday, day 12, our 86th shop at Crazy Redhead Quilting in Newton IA and had a blast with Laura and her staff. They were too willing to help in our celebration!
