When you're out of ideas that quicken your pulse...

Don't start a random quilt you're not really into.

Don't compare yourself to others. Remember, you only see their output, not their digressions.

#### Instead...

Do another hobby you like — you're still a creative person and the brownies could be amazing!

Organize your books, magazines, and bookmarked pages online — inspiration might be there.

Organize your fabric — ironed, folded, sorted and ready for your next inspiration. Get outside — for fresh air, unexpected color combinations in nature, and walking exercise.

Do chores — any quilting will feel great in comparison (even sewing down that binding).

#### To Diane's ideas, I'll add:

Take a class through our Guild or a local quilt shop such as Bernina Connection Book yourself into a retreat or plan a trip to a national quilt show.

Spend time with other quilters at a Sit and Stitch group to see what they're doing. Take a few minutes at the end of the Oct. 13 Guild meeting to connect with someone whose quilt knocked your socks off during Show and Tell.

So, HAPPY QUILTING! both to those whose minds are bursting with creative ideas AND to those not in that happy place for the moment.

## November 2022 Block of the Month – August Variation

This month's 12.5" block is another variation on a classic nine-patch star, and a subtle variation on August's block. It is a also good block for a large-scale print—my layer cake set has several squares with large prints that I hated to cut up into small pieces. It also requires some "creative" piecing to stay within the two 10" square limitation. I used one 10" Kaffe Fassett print square for "Square A" and a solid 10" square for "Square B," and Kona "Snow" for the background fabric. The differences between this block and August's are highlighted in yellow.

#### Materials:

From the layer cake set or other print or solid fabrics:

• two 10" squares, contrasting but complimentary, one is Square A and the other is Square B

From the background fabric:

• one 4" x 16" strip

#### **Cutting instructions:**

Square A

- one 6.5" square
- three 3.5" squares
- two 3" x 3.5" rectangles (will be used to make one 3.5" square)

#### Sauare B

four 4" squares

#### Background Fabric

four 4" squares

#### **Assembly:**

- Sew the 3"x 3.5" rectangles together along the longer side, then trim the resulting piece to 3.5" x 3.5" (This is what I call creative piecing)
- Make eight half-square triangles from the Square B and Background fabric 4" squares. Trim these to 3.5" as shown in this tutorial.
- Make four half-square triangles pairs with Background fabric on the outside and Square B fabric to the inside. (see illustration).
- Sew two half-square triangle pairs to each side of the 6.5" square carefully, so you don't lose your points). This tutorial will show you how to avoid losing the points. Press seams toward the center square.
- Sew one 3.5" Square A fabric square to each end of the other half-square triangle pairs. Press seams toward the outer squares.
- Sew the long sections to the top and bottom of the center square section, points facing toward the center, taking care not to lose the points when you sew these sections together. (See finished square.) Press seams toward center.
- Trim block to 12.5" if needed.

## **Upcoming Classes in 2023**

## Adding Beads to Your Quilts

A Workshop taught by Sharon Pollock January 20, 2023 9 am - noon 5980 Colonel Scott Drive Tallahassee FL 32308 \$25 class limited to 9 participants

This workshop will teach you how to embellish your quilts with beads. It will cover choosing beads that are compatible with your quilt style, the best way to secure the beads and at what stage of the quilt construction process to add them, and how to take care of your beaded quilt.



Supplies needed for this workshop are minimal—an 8" square of quilting fabric, scissors, a washcloth to keep your beads from escaping, and a snack to keep your energy up (if needed). Sharon will provide beads, thread, needles, and coffee.

#### Impressionist Quilts—Strip by Strip

A Workshop taught by Leslie Cohen February 18, 2023 9 am -2 pm Woodville Community Center 8000 Old Woodville Highway Tallahassee FL 32315 \$25 class limited to 12 participants

This workshop will teach you how make a quilt inspired by an impressionist painting of Van Gogh using ripped fabric strips instead of paint strokes. Leslie created this technique for a fabric challenge in 2017 and the result was amazing! She will share with you how to interpret the impressionist technique with fabric and create your own original work of art.

#### Sashiko—By Hand or Machine

Two Half-day Workshops taught by Pam Doffek Saturday March 18 Woodville Community Center 8000 Old Woodville Highway Tallahassee FL 32315 \$30 per class, or \$50 for both classes (Fees include kits)

#### Hand Sashiko (9:30-12:30)

Sashiko (pronounced: Saa-She-Koh, not Sash-eye-ko) is an antique Japanese hand embroidery technique used by peasant and lower class workers to provide warmth to clothing and decoration at the same time. It was traditionally done on 2 layers of indigo (dark) fabrics with a thick thread and no "batting". Sashiko history and patterns will be discussed in class. I've taught this class since 2004 and its resurgence and adaptation to quilting are heartening as it's a very flexible technique.

Kits with fabric, thread, needles, and patterns will be



included in the class fee. The class project will be an 18" X 24" sampler of patterns suitable for a pillow, table centerpiece or incorporation into an apron or other piece of clothing.

A student supply list will be provided with class payment.

#### Machine Sashiko (1:30-4:30)

Sashiko CAN be done on a domestic sewing machine, all you need is a straight stitch machine that can vary the stitch length. Although we will work on 2 layers of fabric (no batting) the machine technique expands well to projects made with lightweight batting, embellishment on clothing or quilting on a layered quilt. Alternative use of noncotton threads and decorative stitches as well as Sashiko machines will be discussed but not done in class.



Kits with fabric, patterns and water-soluble stabilizer will be included in the class fee. The class project

will be a 12" X 18" oval placemat. Students will provide their own binding/finishing technique outside of class. The class will require a machine that minimum does straight stitch and walking food (optional).

A student supply list will be provided with class payment.

## How to Make a "Bucket Hat"

What's a bucket hat? It's a hat you may make for yourself or others out of your



beautiful quilt scraps or fat quarters. Here is the link to the free bucket hat & tutorial that I downloaded from the Orange Bettie site.

Personally, I found it fun and easy--but after sewing and quilting for a very long time--I try to set up new projects to be easy. So, I'm going to add a few tips in case you are totally new to hat making.

- 1. Download all the pattern pieces and directions & print them. Also view the video.
- 2. If you are going to use good quality quilting cotton--make sure you have lightweight iron-on interfacing on hand. It's gonna be the same

kind you would back t-shirts for a t-shirt quilt.

3. Read all the directions first --all the way through! Orange Bettie has wonderful directions & pix.

- 4. Make sure you have a new needle & your bobbin area is clean. Put on your 1/4" foot.
- 5. Sew SLOWLY--you are going to be mostly sewing in circles & you are sewing circular pieces together--you don't want to end up with gathers or bunches.



6. Go really easy on the pins. If you have 4 little clips like Orange Bettie--use those--but only 4. Otherwise--just put 4 pins--at the 2 seams & notches for the whole hat. Pins are your enemy--they stretch your fabric--they may engage your machine needle in an accident--but it's not really an accident because pins are sharp and aggressive & were forged in a dark place to torture home sewers.

(\*\*\*note--you can probably sew this up

quicker than me--sewing straight through--but I like to avoid late night sewing where I screw up and have to sit around picking out stitches.)

Here's the 3 day schedule that fits me.

- 1. Cut out all pieces & iron on interfacing- yes--cut those notches (one morning--1 hour)
- 2. Sew hat & lining & put them together (about 2 hours)
- 3. Sew all the top stitching on the brim (about 2 hours) get up and stretch-put on music--have a snack--don't do them all at once.

After you sew one hat and you are delighted--then you can mass produce if you want.

I've made three: two for me & one for a friend.

Remember--they fold up well for travel and hiking & if it gets really hot--you may dip them in ice water before wearing.
