Introducing the 2023 Block of the Month...It's as Easy as BOM-2-3

For 2023, we will create blocks to strengthen or reinforce piecing skills using shapes and techniques of most quilt block patterns. It will be as easy as BOM-2-3.

Each month has a theme and two block patterns. The "Starting Point" block will showcase the technique in a simple block pattern. The "Next Level" block will build on that same technique with slightly more difficulty.

It's easy to participate...whether you can make one block in the year or two blocks each month, you can join in on the fun! You can make the Starting Point block, the Next Level block or both. This year, you can make the blocks to keep or make blocks to donate to charity. If making blocks for charity, we request you make the blocks in red, white and blue fabrics as we will use these for veteran quilts.

Bring your February Bowtie and/or Snowball blocks to display at the meeting and enter your name for a chance to win a prize.

March's theme and patterns are below and on the guild website with more details.

March Block of the Month

March's Theme – Strip Piecing

This month blocks will highlight ways to create blocks using long strips. Strip piecing typically uses width of fabric (WOF) strips and multiple sub-units are cut from the WOF to create multiple blocks.

Fabric requirements listed below make 1 block.

Remember to carefully cut your fabric, sew with a scant quarter inch seam allowance, and carefully press your pieces.

Starting Point Block: Rail Fence – 12" Block – 3 Colors



<u>Fabric Needed</u>: Background, Color 1 & Color 2 = Cut $1 - 2\frac{1}{2}$ " x 26" strip Directions:

Step One: Sew Color 1 strip to Background strip. Be careful on long seams to sew straight and at a scant quarter inch. Press towards Color 1. Strip now measures 4 1/2" wide.

Step Two: Sew color 2 strip to the background strip. Press towards Color 2. Strip now measures 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ ' wide.

Step Three: Carefully layout strip on cutting mat and cut strip into 4 - 6 1/2" squares.

Step Four: Layout a unit with the Color 1 strip on the left vertically. To the right of that unit, layout another unit with the Color 1 strip on the top horizontally. Sew together and press towards the vertical strip.

Step Five: Layout a unit with the Color 1 strip on the top horizontally. To the right of that unit, layout another unit with the Color 1 strip on the left vertically. Sew together and press towards the vertical strip.

Step Six: Layout the units with the Color 1 outside vertical strip on top and Color 2 outside vertical strip on bottom and sew together. Press.

Next Level Block: Roman Coins – 12" Block – 4 or 5 Colors



<u>Fabric Needed</u>: Colors 1-4 = Cut 1 – 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 31 $\frac{1}{2}$ " strip *Note in photos below Color 2 and Color 4 fabrics are same Background = Cut 2 – 2" x 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ " strips

Directions:

Step One: Sew together Color 1 and Color 2 strips. Press to Color 2.

Step Two: Sew together Color 3 and Color 4 strips. Press to Color 4. (Strips should now measure 2 ½" across.)

Step Three: Sew Color 3/4 strip to Color 1/2 strip. Press in same direction as other seams. (Strip should now measure $4\frac{1}{2}$ " across.)

Step Four: Carefully layout strip unit on cutting mat and cut at 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ " increments. (3- 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ " units)

Step Five: Sew the two units together on the $10 \frac{1}{2}$ " length, keeping the same fabric placement. Press in same direction as other seams.

Step Six: Sew the third unit repeating the same fabric placement as previous two units. Press in same direction as other seams.

Step Seven: Carefully layout strip unit on cutting mat and cut at 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ " increments. (3-3 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ " units)

Step Eight: Layout out all three Strip Units in same direction with strips horizontal. Rotate Strip Unit 2 180 degrees.

Step Nine: Sew Background strip to right hand side of Strip Unit 1. Press to Background. Repeat with Strip Unit 2.

Step Ten: Sew Strip Unit 2/B to right hand side (background) of Strip Unit 1/B and press to Background.

Step Eleven: Sew Strip Unit 3 to Strip Unit 1/B/2/B. Press to Background.

Swap Meet Information and Guidelines

"Regrets—I've had a few" or so sang Frank Sinatra in My Way. You may feel the same way about some of your quilting acquisitions, but the Quilters Unlimited Swap Meet is your chance to turn your mistakes into someone else's lucky find!

At the March 9 meeting you can sell your surplus or unloved quilting and craft supplies (or anything else that you think would appeal to Guild members) and shop for bargains from your fellow quilters. Here are guidelines for participating in the swap meet:

- Table rentals cost \$10 for a whole table, \$5 for half of a table. You can reserve a table on the Quilters Unlimited website or at the February meeting.
- Tables can be rented by individuals or groups.
- If you rent half of a table, please bring something (painters' tape, a ping pong net, etc.) to subdivide the table.
- On the night of the Swap Meet you can come into the meeting space at 5:45 to set up your items.
- Please bring a sheet or something to cover up the merchandise until the business segment of the meeting is completed.
- There will be no sales until the Swap Meet begins.
- Sellers are responsible for making change for their sales.
- All items that are not sold must be removed from the meeting space at the end of the evening.

February 18, 2023 9:00 am – 2:00 pm Woodville Community Center 8000 Old Woodville Highway; Tallahassee This class will teach you how make a quilt inspired by an impressionist painting of Van Gogh using ripped fabric strips instead of paint strokes. Leslie created this technique for a fabric challenge in 2017 and the result was amazing! She will share with you how to interpret the impressionist technique with fabric and create your own original work of art.

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SASHIKO – BY HAND — taught by Pam Doffek

March 18, 2023 9:30 am – 12:30 pm



Woodville Community Center

Sashiko (pronounced: Saa-She-Koh, not Sash-eye-ko) is an antique Japanese hand embroidery technique used by peasant and lower class workers to provide warmth to clothing and decoration at the same time. It was traditionally done on 2 layers of indigo (dark) fabrics with a thick thread and no "batting". Sashiko history and patterns will be discussed in class. I've taught this class since 2004 and its resurgence and adaptation to quilting are heartening as it's a very flexible technique.

Kits with fabric, thread, needles, and patterns will be included in the class fee. The class project will be an 18" X 24" sampler of patterns

suitable for a pillow, table centerpiece or incorporation into an apron or other piece of clothing.

A student supply list will be provided with class payment.

\$30 per class, or \$50 for both classes (see Sashiko – By Machine; same day, 1:30–4:30) (Fees include kits.) Sign up at a Guild meeting.

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SASHIKO – BY MACHINE — taught by Pam Doffek



March 18, 2023 1:30 pm – 4:30 pm Woodville Community Center 8000 Old Woodville Highway; Tallahassee

Sashiko CAN be done on a domestic sewing machine, all you need is a straight stitch machine that can vary the stitch length. Although we will work on 2 layers of fabric (no batting) the machine technique expands well to projects made with lightweight batting, embellishment on clothing or quilting on a layered quilt. Alternative use of non-cotton threads and

decorative stitches as well as Sashiko machines will be discussed but not done in class.

Kits with fabric, patterns and water-soluble stabilizer will be included in the class fee. The class project will be a 12" X 18" oval placemat. Students will provide their own binding/finishing technique outside of class. The class will require a machine that minimum does straight stitch and walking foot (optional).

A student supply list will be provided with class payment.

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SERENDIPITY BLOCKS REDUX — taught by Pam Doffek



March 25, 2023 10 am – 4:30 pm

A repeat of Pam's popular Serendipity Blocks pattern, with a twist: pre coordinated/color theory bags of fabric!!

Serendipity Blocks is Pam's adaptation of a Log Cabin block construction. BUT, it uses all kinds of fabrics with no need to rotary cut or premeasure during construction. It appeals to the Type A as well as the free-spirited quilter/top maker. The squares can be made into any size, but 10"–15" are the best. We will make 12" – 14" blocks in class which will make a wonderful 24" x 36" quilt top

suitable for the center of a larger quilt, or add borders to make it bigger. Instructions and a demonstration of my "2-Trips/1-Quilt" method for assembling any kind of square blocks with only 2-trips to the ironing board are included as well as several handouts on quilt dimensions.

A bag of fabric, pre-coordinated for various colorways (monochromatic, complimentary, analogous in several colors), instructions and handouts are included in the class fee. Ironing boards, cutting mats and some square rulers will be provided.

Students should bring a machine that does straight stitch (no zigzag or other stitches required, making this a great class for Featherweights and portables).

A complete supply list will be included with payment. \$30 per class (Fee includes fabric bags and instructions.)
